2. LEARNING OUTCOMES

<p>Learning Outcomes</p>
<p>The course aims at familiarising students with civil law and relevant issues. It includes a historical overview and major concepts and principles of civil law as well as fundamental information on Criminal, Property, Family, and Inheritance law.</p> <p>In addition, it aims at enabling students to understand various legal procedures as regards the financial dimension of transactions, and the significance of law in modern governance and economy.</p> <p>In detail, the course focuses on enabling students to understand:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • the legislative framework of civil law as an independent branch of private law • the concepts of "natural" and "legal" entities in the context of modern economy • the interaction of economics and civil law • case study analyses by relying on reasoning and argumentation to address/solve key legal problems about households, businesses and other entities • establishing legal entities and relevant contracts and agreements <p>Upon successful completion of the course, the student should:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • identify individual legal entities and various types of contracts • be familiar with family and succession rights <p>General learning outcomes</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • understanding the significance of civil law in commercial transactions and financial services • learning about the role of legislation in Greece, by focusing on case studies, and, thus, being able to interpret and apply legislative provisions, and solve simple practical problems related to civil law. <p>1.1. Knowledge</p> <p>The students will acquire special knowledge of the Greek civil law in a wider financial and social context and will become familiar with law language and way of thinking as well as the concepts of entities (natural and legal) and the legal consequences during commercial transactions.</p> <p>1.2. Skills</p> <p>The students will be taught about the interaction of theory and practice in law, especially as regards contracts, and the rights and obligations of natural and legal entities. They will also</p>

improve their scientific and creative thinking and be able to work in interdisciplinary and international contexts. By engaging in group work, they will be familiar with contemporary aspects of the current legislation and methods of drawing up contracts and legal acts. In addition, they will examine specific legal documents and practices.

1.3. Abilities

The students are expected to acquire the relevant background and ability to apply scientific analyses of the process and implementation of Civil law, and they will be able to meet business legal requirements, in accounting and finance contexts.

3. COURSE CONTENTS

- a. Principles of Civil Law - Legal capacity of natural and legal entities. Rights and legal actions. Non-valid and voidable legal acts, provisions and representation.
- b. General principles of Criminal Law – Guilt. Objections.
- c. Special Tort Law - Sale transactions. Leasing. Contracts. Indemnity. Liabilities. Tort.
- d. Property Law – Ownership. Servitude. Collaterals and mortgages. Jurisdiction and possession.
- e. Family Law – Pre- and post-nuptial agreements and matrimonial property regimes. Relations between spouses. Alimony. Surrogacy and adoption.
- f. Inheritance Law – Succession. Inheritance rights. Acceptance and renouncement of inheritance.
