- Economic importance of Greek shipping and tourism, with detailed reference to the characteristics, the issues it faces and the importance for the economy.
- Per Capita Domestic Product, State Budget and its preparation, Public Deficit and Debt, Public Debt management and Greek Balance of Payments.
- Employment, unemployment and its characteristics and long-term labor market trends.
- Income inequality in Greece, Shadow economy and corruption., Research and Development and Innovation of the country.
- Brief presentation of the relations of the Greek economy, businesses and investments with the countries of Southeast Europe.
- Reference to the theories of International Trade, both traditional and modern, as well as presentation of the theory of Trade Policy.
- Institutional framework & agencies that determine global economic relations.
- Reference to international monetary relations, the foreign exchange market, the international financial markets. Theory and practice of Monetary and Economic Unification.
- Internationalization of Capital and businesses, forms of capital placement abroad and results.
- International labor movements, with historical reference, theoretical interpretation and reference to immigration policy.
- Multinational companies, globalization, global business, European Globalization Adjustment Fund and Global Trade of Pollution Units.
- Finally, the Global Economic Crisis and its effects, the European Support Mechanism with

the participation of the International Monetary Fund and the Support Mechanism of the Greek Economy are presented.
